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MULTIPLE ESSAY TYPES

- Common Application: Personal Statement
- Supplemental Essays:
 Additional essays required by many colleges & universities for general admission, honors programs, or certain majors
- University of California: Personal Insight Questions. (UC PIQs)
- Coalition Application, unique College application essays (ie Georgetown)

Pro Tips:

- Be prepared to write several drafts of each essay.
- Have one or two trusted people review, provide feedback, edit if needed.
- Writing well takes time.
 Make sure you plan in advance and give yourself the time you need.

UC PIQS:

- Applicant chooses 4 out of 8 PIQ prompts.
- Each PIQ essay is 350 words maximum.
- Choose topics and questions strategically to ensure readers see a multi faceted applicant. Avoid repeatedly using the same topic with different questions.
- This <u>UC link</u> provides excellent guidance for thinking through each question.



COMMON APPLICATION PERSONAL STATEMENT

- Brainstorm several topics before reviewing the prompts. You will find a prompt for your idea. Especially as prompt 7 is a topic of your choosing!
- Essay limit of 650 words.
- Click here for <u>7 prompts</u> in the 2021–2022 cycle.

SUPPLEMENTAL ESSAYS

- Word limits range from 100-650.
- "Why this school?" and "Why this major" are the most common questions.
- Colleges deeply value supplemental essays and use them to assess a student's interest in their school.
- Take these essays seriously.
 Don't leave them to the last minute.

DO'S AND DON'TS FOR ALL ESSAYS

DO'S:

- Get to the point of the essay quickly- Students often make the mistake of a long introduction, setting the stage, providing a backstory. Consider moving your final paragraphs to the beginning of your essay.
- Tell a story. Avoid any generalizations - use DETAILS! Provide specific some examples descriptions and that illustrate your point. Let the reader see or hear the situation and how you experienced it.





• Use the **Active voice**: A stronger, more concise writing style, the active voice removes unnecessary words (that, would, of, the) cluttering a sentence. Ex:

Passive:

The letter was mailed by Paul.

Active:

Paul mailed the letter.

- Write in the first person:
 Use "I" when telling your story. The admissions officer wants to hear your voice-the authentic, honest you.
- Start writing early and finish before deadlines.

- Communicate your "take away": Also known as "so what" what did you learn about yourself or get out of the topic you are writing about. Often (but not always) you can bring this understanding to a college community.
- Proofread for style and accuracy. Every word counts and should add to your essay. Be sure to proofread your final version within the application itself.



DONT'S:

• Shop your essay around to multiple readers or reviewers: Ask someone who knows you well and someone who writes well to review it. Too many editors can muddle your thoughts and words.



- Reference any specific college in your Common App Personal Statement or PIQs.
- Exceed the word limit.
- Write about disciplinary
 or poor performance
 issues. The Common App
 and UC app have a
 separate space to explain
 these issues.
- Rewrite your resume or activity list, as this information is already in the application. However, you can choose one or two activities from that section or your resume to use as a vehicle to portray yourself more completely.
- Be afraid to change topics: If your essay is not working- change it. You will go through several drafts.

COMMON ESSAY TOPICS NEED AN UNCOMMON TELLING

If you plan to use one of these topics, be prepared to write a strong or unusual story around them. Readers see these topics often, so choose another topic OR make yours stand out!

- Sports: success, injury, challenge: Must show how this shaped you as a person.
- Immigrant story: keep focus on you, not the relatives.
- Academic or Artistic success, struggle: Overall focus must be how you dealt with it, learned and grew from it.
- Travel story: Can be used effectively if focus on meaningful event or person during the trip and how it changed you. Beware of showing too much privilege.

- Legos: How a passion for legos led to an interest in engineering.
- Tragedies or Trials:
 More appropriate for the "additional information" section. Don't let this define you.
